## INTRODUCING OUR NEW CLUB ADMINISTRATOR - DAVID FORNUSEK



David was born in Kent, England. His father was a Czechoslovakian Spitfire Pilot who fought for the RAF and his mother an Englishwoman in the RAF. ## AN INTERESTING HAND (CLUB CAPTAIN) HUGH McALISTER

### TIP OF THE MONTH #3 - Focus on defence - basic "attitude" signals



**Bidding**: South has a textbook weak 2 and opens 2S. West might consider a 3H overcall, but is probably too weak (1 more heart and 1 less spade and 3H would be good). Either way, North has a good hand, a "fit" in spades, and bids 4S. **Lead:** A textbook "top of a sequence" lead of KH. What would you do as East?

Play: East sees North's strong diamonds, and can predict that if partner doesn't switch to Clubs declarer will throw his club losers on dummy's diamonds – (s)he discourages hearts with a high card, the 10, expecting partner to switch to a Club). West gets the message (a diamond switch makes no sense) and leads the 2C (low encourage). Declarer plays the 7C, and East confidently wins with the 10C (East knows that West showed an honour with the low 2C lead). East now leads the KC, knocking out dummy's AC, and when West gets in with AD (s)he also cashes the QC for 1 down.

#### **LESSONS:**

- "Low encourage, high discourage" (also known as "reverse attitude") is one of the commonest defensive signals. It applies to both the leader and his/her partner. Leading low suggests "like," leading high denies strength. Partner indicates interest with a low card, and disinterest with a high card. Previous generations used the opposite ("natural attitude"), but reverse attitude has largely superseded that.
- 2. Both partners needed to **trust each other** to defeat this contract. West needs to get the message to switch to a Club and East needs to play 10C on the first round. If West continues with QH at trick 2 (as many would!), declarer makes an overtrick!!

### AT MINI CONGRESS

We recently held our annual Mini Congress during Anniversary Weekend. Peter and June Hagan stepped in as substitutes for a pair who were delayed. Richard Solomon from NZ Bridge published the following article about their wonderful success on his blog and I recommend that you check it out!! Peter is a Life Member of Tauranga Bridge Club and a Past President.

### MUSINGS AT THE TABLE

Last month we introduced the topic of alerts, when to alert and when not to. Basically, with the exceptions we discussed, all bids which convey special meaning to partner must be alerted by the partner. This can be quite subtle...e.g. over a 1NT opener and transfer into a major, just bidding the major at the 2 level should be alerted by those who play "superaccepts" – 1NT – 2H\* - 2S\* (2H is alerted as a transfer to spades, and 2S is alerted to show opener denies 4 spades, for example).

Who can ask for an explanation about an alert? [always ask the bidder's partner, not the bidder]

- Either defender, but only at their turn to bid
- Declarer can ask either opponent, at any time, what their partner's bid or play might mean
- · Dummy may NOT ask at any time

### **BUT THERE ARE SOME IMPORTANT NO-NOs:**

- Don't ask for an explanation just because a bid has been alerted – if you want to learn about interesting bids, ask at the end of the hand, or later. You may have strength in the suit bid, and want to know, but it is usually best to wait.
- 2. Don't ask for an explanation if you have no intention to bid...of course, if you need to confirm what is happening before you bid, go ahead.
- 3. It is often best, if you want to ask, to wait until the bidding is finished, and the person on lead asks for a "review of the bidding"... DO NOT point to a suit in dummy and say, e.g., "what did 3D mean?"
- 4. The partner of the opening leader MUST NOT ask...after all, they will see dummy before they need to decide what to play

The reason for all these rules is to try and avoid the asker subconsciously suggesting a lead to partner... more on alerting next month (it's a big topic)... AND REMEMBER: DON'T offer unsolicited advice regarding bidding or play...
