PRESIDENT'S PONDERINGS...



This month our newest players are emerging from their protective cocoons and starting to play proper club bridge and tournaments as well with our Nov ice / Junior / Intermediate tournament at the end of the month.

As I move around the room on a Monday or Friday I get a lot of questions about how the lessons have gone this year and it's clear that you all understand how important the lessons are for the growth of the club. So I thought this month I would give you an update on how the lesson programme has gone and the plans for 2026.

This year we reintroduced daytime lessons in addition to evening lessons. Initially it looked like we would have about 12 on Friday afternoon and 16 on Wednesday afternoon but by the time we got to the start of the lesson programme in early March this had whittled down to 8 and 12 respectively. As we progress through the three months of lessons we inevitably lose some along the way and so we finished up with 16 graduating in June but we gained a couple right at the end who were happy to catch up through self-teaching and a little bit of guidance from me, a most impressive effort!

While 18 new players doesn't sound too bad there is still room for improvement given that we can cater for 48 across the lesson timeslots. A lot of this comes down to our marketing drive at the start of the year, what works one year doesn't work the next and so it is hard to pinpoint what the winning formula is. We have been very fortunate to secure a spot at the Bay Home Show in early October where we hope to emulate the success a similar event had over 10 years ago where they had 120 people through the lessons.

I believe another issue is the length of the lesson programme and this presents us with two problems. Firstly, some people sign up but then realise they're going to be on a cruise or something for a month in the middle and so (quite rightly) decide it doesn't make sense to start something they aren't going to be able to finish. Secondly, after five years now of taking the beginners lessons it has become clear to me that at least 80% of the beginners struggle with the amount of material they are required to remember. No one lesson is particularly difficult but with one thing being piled on another it is just too much for most people.

And so I am investigating running a cutdown lesson programme for next year which potentially allows us to run multiple, shorter sets of lessons each year to help with the busy lives problem while also reducing the mental load. This coincides with NZBridge doing a complete overhaul of the lesson material. Although we are yet to see the final product of this overhaul it is supposedly going to be a lot more modular to allow teachers to pick and choose what they adopt and what they leave out.

This may mean that our beginners initially emerge from the lessons without some of the knowledge we would usually expect of our novices. Maybe they don't know about pre-empt bids, takeout doubles or ace asking. These are the sorts of conventions that they don't need to get out and play some cards and just put the basics they do know into practice. It just means we need to add more structure so that when they are ready we can add in all those extra bits.

So, there are definitely some challenges ahead but I am feeling positive that with these changes we can improve our retention of new players which helps us to grow the club in the longer term.

REMINDERS

- Please make sure you check in with your partner prior to the playing day. We've had a couple of whoopsies lately with double bookings which has resulted in someone going home.
- Please, please, please make sure you wash your hands when you go to the bathroom.
 General hygiene however if you saw the dirt & grime that we clean off the dealing machine each week you'd probably wash your hands more often.
- Your Committee meets on the third Tuesday of the month... The Suggestion Box is on the front desk & is checked every meeting.
- The orange cones are placed in the car park to reserve the spot for members with particular needs... we appreciate you not using those parks.



TIP OF THE MONTH #21



"The Challenge of the Yarborough"

Hugh McAlister



Bidding: West opens 1D, North has a powerful hand and doubles. East passes and South bids 1H. West rebids 2D (a good bid with 6 diamonds and extra values), and North bids 4H.

Lead: West leads AD, then follows that with the KD.

Play: On the second trick what does East discard?

Lessons:

- With such a poor hand it is easy to "lose concentration..." one senses that one's input into this hand will not be great! Nothing could be further from the truth. The answer to the question above (a trick question, so as not to give the game away)...is ...a trump!
- 2. East must see the powerful hand in dummy, remember that partner bid twice, and at least consider the possibility that partner has AQ of clubs. If partner has them, and you do not lead through declarer now, declarer will be able to discard her/his Clubs on dummy's spades. The only opportunity to do this is NOW, and you must trump partner's trick to get the lead.
