PRESIDENT'S PONDERINGS...

Tis the season for... Holiday Bridge! Since the regular club calendar is drawing to a close for the year I wanted to take the time to remind everyone about Holiday Bridge and how it runs a little differently to our normal sessions throughout the year.

The first and most important thing about Holiday Bridge is that it is very low key. We often get visitors from out of town here on a summer holiday that come along, our Wednesday Junior night also doesn't run during this period so our novice players join in the fun. So to keep things relaxed and casual there are no multi-week events and therefore no prizes.

The other thing that is very popular is that you don't need a partner for Holiday Bridge. We have a rostered on standby player who will jump in if we end up with an odd number of players. So if you find yourself at a loose end on a Monday night you can just come along without a partner and be guaranteed a game. If you're also happy to put your name down as the standby player for a session that would also be much appreciated, the roster sheet is on the noticeboard at the club.

So when is Holiday Bridge running?
Monday nights from 6:45pm, Tuesday and
Friday afternoons from 12:45pm. Please
ensure you arrive on time so we can work
out how many we have with out partners
and get everyone squared away promptly.
We have one week of Holiday Bridge in
December straight after the Christmas
Party and then we resume on the 5th of
January all the way through to Auckland
Anniversary weekend. The normal club
calendar resumes on Tuesday the 27th of
January.

Holiday Bridge is particularly important for our newer players because two months completely away from the bridge table is enough to make you forget some things! As such, during January, we are going to run a few sessions aimed at those who have learned in the past couple of years just to re cap the bidding basics and have you ready to hit the ground running again in February. These will run alongside the bootcamp sessions we usually run for more experienced players.

So I would encourage all of you to come along and keep your hand in over the Summer period, escape the heat and come have a play with the new BridgeMates!

ALERTING STAYMAN

There have been a couple of times throughout the year where questions have arisen around when you have to alert Stayman and when you don't.

To preface this discussion we should first look at the relevant regulations. NZBridge actually has its own rule around this and so it will be different in other countries. In the NZBridge Manual it states "...the following bids are in such common use that they are deemed to be self-alerting: simple Stayman 2• responses to INT opening bids and the 2• response denying a 4-card major".

And so we have the reason why we don't alert Stay man. You will note though that the regulation quoted is quite specific that it only applies to Stayman in response to a INT **opening bid**. This means that if you play simple Stayman in response to a INT overcall or a 2NT opening bid, or anywhere else, it should be alerted.

The regulation also goes on to say "Stayman after an opponent's double should be alerted". So if you open INT, the opponent immediately following you doubles, your partner bids 24 and your partnership agreement says that is still simple Stayman, then you must alert it.

Finally, 2• over a INT opening bid must always be alerted if it's not natural (doesn't promise clubs) and not simple Stayman, i.e. a 5-card major ask or Puppet Stayman or some other elaborate convention you found on the dark web!

TIP OF THE MONTH #25 | Optimal defence – reading Declarer's hand

West leads KD against 6S. Declarer wins with AD and leads QS... Do you

Lessons:

What does Declarer have? Probably at least 6 spades, possibly 7. (S)he will almost certainly have AH, maybe QC (if not it is finessable), and very likely a diamond loser... in fact South has:

AJ9875 Α7 Q85

cover or not? Choose now...

Lead KD

- East must not cover. If Declarer has 6 or 7 spades, covering cannot possibly promote any thing. If East follows low, smoothly, South will likely rise with the AS.
- Declarer's plan is to throw her/his losing diamond on dummy's fourth club, but East will ruff the third round with KS and give partner their QD.... one down.
- This is an excellent example of reading Declarer's hand from the bidding.

Lessons:

- You need, initially, to find 4 discards... forget about telling partner what to lead... the contract is 7S! What can you afford to discard?
- 2. 4NT is Roman Key Card Blackwood, and 5S shows 2 "keycards" (aces + K of trumps) and QS.
- From Declarer's play you can deduce (s)he is not interested in hearts. If (s)he was, they would play A and K hearts and then trump 1 or 2 hearts. Throwing 4 hearts will likely not give anything away. Declarer may have AKJ of diamonds... throwing one might help her/him. The one thing you cannot do is throw clubs.... you must keep "parity" (same number of cards) with dummy.
- 4. This is an excellent example of *reading Declarer's hand from* her/his play. In fact South has:

AKJ1063 K7 AK4

If you discard one club, declarer can play AK of clubs, ruff a club with the last trump and discard her/his losing diamond on the fourth club.

- Bridge is a risk-taking game.
 Don't need safe! Need COURAGE.
- Overcalling with a decent suit is to give partner a lead nudge.
- Do not overcall a suit that doesn't have at least KQ - want to have a winner when partner leads it.
- · Lead the top of a doubleton ALWAYS
- Lead the top of a sequence.
- · 10 is an honour card
- 3 cards headed by an honour lead the lowest promising an honour e.g. K73... lead the 3.1074...lead the 4.
- If you have 4-5 losers in your hand DOUBLE!
- If you have 6 losers BID!
- If you play Mud i.e. middle, up, down you have NO doubleton nor an honour.
