PRESIDENT'S PONDERINGS...

AFTERNOON TEA

This month I'd like to go into some more detail on "X-Clubs."

I briefly touched on this back in February when I talked about how the hands we play are generated in one place and distributed to all the participating clubs. But there's much more to it than that!

The basic purpose of X-Clubs is to score across as large and varied a field as possible in order to give players a more accurate picture of how they have performed in a session. It does this by combining all the results from all of the participating clubs and then rescoring each board across this much larger field. So instead of just comparing your score on board 7 to the dozen other NS pairs playing at the club you will now have your score compared with a couple of hundred scores from around the country. All of this is possible because all participating clubs play the same hands at the same time every day of the week.

To find the X-Clubs results head to the club website and you'll find a link in the Results menu at the top of the home page. You'll be linked through to a page with a calendar view of the current week that shows all the club sessions played by participating clubs each day. If you're looking for an older session then just use the "Week before" link above the calendar to go back in time. The full X-Clubs results for the session can be viewed by clicking the "Ladder" or "overall" links. If you drill down deep enough, you'll be able to see the results for each board which include the hundreds of different contracts and results played around the country!

But wait, there's more! At the top of the X-Clubs homepage you'll see a little message about a site called Pianola. Pianola takes all of the X-Clubs results and performs a bunch of analysis on them so it can give you deeper insights into your performance, particularly if you create an account (for free) and link your results to it. It will then break down your percentages into how well you did when you were declarer, defender or lead, defender not on lead or even dummy!

The great thing about all this is that we really don't have to do anything to make it happen. When we score our results at the end of a session the results are automatically forwarded on to X-Clubs. Note that only results for pairs sessions are sent through to X-Clubs so if you played in a Teams or Swiss Pairs session you won't be able to find it on X Clubs.

PLEASE NOTE the biscuits in the kitchen cup board are not there for general 'help yourself' consumption.


The Biscuit Fairy welcomes your 'gift' of biscuits and/or money to keep the supply going. *Thank you to those who make regular contributions!!*

Bidding: South opens 1D, North raises to 3D (10 12pts. diamond support, no 4 card major), and South converts to 3NT.

Lead: with few clues, the top-of-the-sequence JC lead would be standard.

Play: Plan the play...you have 6 quick tricks, more to develop in diamonds and spades....what can go wrong? You invoke the mantra "eight ever, nine never," play A and K of diamonds, then suddenly West gets in with the QD, leads JH through dummy's QH, and you are two down!!

Lessons:

- 1. The most useful "rule" is that "all rules are made to be broken." There are many exceptions to this "8 ever, 9 never" rule, and today we see an important one... when losing to the Queen gives the danger hand the lead. We can handle losing a trick to QD in East's hand....so....play AC, then KD and run the 9D. As it happens, your finesse wins. It is easy now to set up a spade trick and make an overtrick. It is important to play a particular suit in the way that suits the hand best (safest).
- 2. Crucial to the decision-making here is the realisation that West is the "danger" hand ...so deliberately finesse into the East hand, even if you have nine cards and may not need to.
- 3. Notice that some Wests may have been lucky enough to lead JH...in this case, South holds up twice and can still make their contract by finding the QD.
- 4. Some Norths might respond 2NT instead of 3D... showing a balanced 10-12 pts and denying a 4card major. Again, South would bid on to 3NT with a balanced hand and extra values...but now North would be declarer, and the initial lead may be a heart, gifting N/S another trick. 3D is probably the better bid from North...South, with extra points and covers in all suits, then needs to convert to 3NT, as this is usually much easier to make than 5 of a minor.

MINI BRIDGE

I hadn't ever played Mini Bridge until I assisted Mike with the lessons this year. For those of you who haven't, it's a lot of fun and a marvellous way to introduce children and other family members to Bridge.

DID YOU KNOW?



Deal a pack of cards to the 4 players. Use a bidding pad. You take turns dealing (obviously) and the dealer first, writes their total point count down in the first square. Usual A = 4, K = 3, Q = 2, J = 1.



The person with the highest points is nominated Declarer. The opposition to the left of Declarer plays a card (leads), Dummy's hand goes down and Declarer works out what the Contract will be.



A total of 25 = game in NT or a major 28 = game in a minor 33 = Slam



Otherwise a part score is established.

ROOM ETIQUETTE REMINDER

Play at the Club on Tuesday was incredibly noisy! PLEASE think of others who are still playing when you've completed your Boards quicker than most. There were some challenging hands, requiring considerable thought and concentration.

PLEASE do NOT discuss the hand you've just played in detail. We overheard in almost card by card detail about a board, just fortunate that we were playing with a feed-in pile which meant we had no idea what board was being played.

NZ BRIDGE

DOUBLES Part 12 | Penalty Doubles

A double is for penalties if:

- It is a double of a INT contract
- · It is a high-level contract
- There is only one unbid suit
- It is a double of an artificial bid.

This double can be made by either player in the partnership.

Use it when:

- The opponents open INT you should have 16+ HCP. With less, you should overcall a good 5+ suit or pass with a minimum opening hand
- The opponents have bid a suit to the 4 or 5-level and you have 4+ good trumps and outside quick tricks
- The opponents have stopped at the 3-level and you have 5+ trumps and outside quick tricks
- The opponents are obviously in a misfit
- You have a good suit in an artificial bid made by the opponent

Examples:

INT X All pass West opens INT (12-14 HCP). North's double shows 16+ HCP. East has nowhere to go and South with 6+ HCP also passes. The NS pair have 21+ HCP against the opponents' 19 HCP at best.

(Stayman), South doubles 2C to show they have a good club suit. West bids 2H (shows a 4-card heart suit). North supports partner with 3C to win the contract

North's double shows they have good trumps and outside quick tricks. Their hand could be something like this:
