PRESIDENT'S PONDERINGS...

This month I'd like to talk about the great spirit of cooperation between our club and our friends across the bridge at the Mount Maunganui Club. Many of you probably aren't aware that the two clubs keep in close contact on all sorts of different issues because when we work together both clubs benefit!

Just last weekend we manned a site at the Bay Home Show with the aim of drumming up interest in lessons for both clubs. Costs were split, we both designed posters and fliers, and then we each took a day to 'man' the site with volunteers playing bridge to entice the public. Fingers crossed both clubs will see some of those players along for lessons in the new year.

For many years now we have collaborated on our lesson programme so that both clubs are running the same lesson on the same week. This allows for our learners to head over to the other club on any given week if the usual timing doesn't work for them. Or they could head to both clubs every week if they're especially keen!

Even our playing sessions are scheduled so as to provide as many options as possible for our members. We have an open club session on Monday nights and a Junior only session on Wednesday nights. The Mount have theirs switched. This means that a keen Junior player could play a Junior only session at the Mount on Monday night and again at Tauranga on a Wednesday night.

We also help each other out with directing and scoring, both tournaments and club sessions. We swap success stories or lessons we learned when it comes to running tournaments, club sessions or lessons. We share things that worked with respect to marketing and player retention. The Mount President Michele and I are heading down to Wellington this weekend to continue those discussions with clubs from all around the country.

Both clubs face the exact same issues and it is this spirit of cooperation that allows us to bounce ideas off each other and come out stronger for it. Many thanks to President Michele and Club Captain Teri and long may our strong mutual relationship continue!




TIP OF THE MONTH #23



Planning your NT Contract

Bidding: South opens INT (balanced 12-14), North bids 2C (simple Stayman) to check for a Heart fit, South bids 2D (no 4 card major) and North bids 3NT.

Lead: undeterred by North's Stayman, West leads 5S (4th highest)... no other lead appeals.

Play:

What are you thinking? You have 5 quick tricks, and can develop 3 more in diamonds and one more in clubs. But you may have to lose the lead twice to do that.

Plan your play... Declarer won the spade lead and played on diamonds, their longest suit. East took AD and played another spade. Now when declarer took the club finesse, West got in and took 3 spades, down 1.

Can you do better? When you may have to lose the lead twice, and have two stoppers, it is often good to duck the first round (so leader's partner is exhausted of their suit when they get the lead). It is also good practice, when you have 2 potential losers, to lose to the "danger hand" first.

So...duck trick 1, win the continuation in dummy, with AS, and lead 3C to finesse the QC. If West wins and clears the spades, now start on diamonds. When East gets in with AD, (s)he has no more spades to lead,... contract made. If West decides to duck the QC finesse, move on to diamonds anyway.

Lessons:

- When you have 2 stoppers, but may have to lose the lead twice to set up your suit(s), it is often best to duck the first round. If the opponents' suit is 5-3, this effectively breaks the op ponents' communication.
- 2. When you have two potential losers before you can set up your suit(s), try and *lose the first trick to the danger hand.* If the clubs were in opposite hands, North and South, you would take the club finesse second, once you know they have no more spades to lead.
- If the danger hand has both AD and KC, you can't make the contract, so don't stress...you have to hope the honours are split, and play accordingly.

A COUPLE OF REMINDERS

OR SOMETHING NEW

RULE OF 20

Count your high card points (HCP) and then add the length of your two longest suits. 20+... open the bidding.

RULE OF 15

Pass defense Pass

In the 4th position your HCP's PLUS the number of SPADES = 15... then open the bidding.

VULNERABLE vs NON VULNERABLE

No risks when vulnerable. When you're not vulnerable you can 'afford' to be a tad cheeky.

SINGLETON K

3 HCP therefore cannot also count 3 for shortage as can easily lose to the Ace.

MISTAKE

When you make a mistake, according to Graham Tufnell (Sky Bridge), change position or focus... Look off into the distance.

LOW LEVEL CONTRACTS

Can earn good scores. If you're unsure, stay low!
